From the Pastor's Desk **Kenneth Boller, SJ**

During the Ministries Retreat on February 10, we were challenged to respond to a question coming from the Synod in Rome last October: "How can we enhance the differentiated co-responsibility in the mission of all members of the People of God?"

The question needs a serious translation remake for most of us. At the heart of the question is the challenge to each of us to acknowledge that we have responsibilities as members of this faith community. On a basic level, when we come to join in the eucharist on Sunday or other days, we take responsibility to pray with and for the community, we raise our voices in song and prayer, we exchange a greeting of peace. It's not a heavy lift but it is essential to forming a community of prayer. Some members of the community assume another responsibility by serving as Mass coordinators, hospitality ministers, lectors, eucharistic ministers, music ministers. (Here's where the "differentiated" part comes in.)

This reminds us of Paul's letter to the Corinthians: "there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same God; and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone. To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good."

Beyond the celebration of the eucharist, some members participate in one or more of the many ministries we have in our parish including the leadership responsibilities of the Finance Council, the Pastoral Council and staff ministry leaders who have received training for fulltime church ministry and serve in various capacities such as music ministry, faith formation, and outreach programs.

During this season of Lent, we Journey Together in Faith. In your prayer, it would be an excellent opportunity to consider what role(s) you are called to assume your response to the Gospel and take responsibility in the community of faith.

Next weekend, the liturgical ministry will be hosting information sessions in the Mary Chapel after the Saturday and Sunday 5 PM masses and the Sunday 11:30 AM. The Sunday 9 AM will gather on March 17. Please come and learn about the different opportunities to serve in our liturgies.

The Hospitality Ministers are the first persons you meet upon entering the church. They greet worshippers, provide them with worship aids, and help them find seating. The Hospitality Ministers take up the collection and recruit worshippers to take up the gifts of bread and wine at the Offertory.

The Lectors proclaim the Word of God for the community and lead us in the Universal Prayers. Their prayerful proclamation of the Word opens our minds and hearts to the Spirit at work.

Eucharistic Ministers assist in distributing the Body and Blood of Christ to the faithful at the mass.

Music Ministers share their vocal gifts with us, leading us in hymns of praise and thanks to God.

What role(s) in our community are you called to? We each have something to contribute. We each have a role to play.

Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross are a fourteen step or devotional, focusing on Jesus' last day on Earth as a human being, beginning with His condemnation to death by Pontius Pilate to His being laid in the tomb. The Stations are used as a mini-pilgrimage, imitating the Via Dolorosa, or Way of Sorrows, in Jerusalem to Mount Calvary. Tradition holds that the pilgrimage was initially followed by the Blessed Mother; though, the earliest mention of a Via Sacra, or Holy Way, was in the mid 15th Century, and permission was granted to erect Stations inside all churches in 1731 by Pope Clement XII. **The Stations will be livestreamed on our Facebook. The Adoration of the Cross will take place before the Stations starting at 5:30 PM.**


